2020 HEALTH CARE LEGISLATIVE CANDIDATE GUIDE

Health care access and cost remains one of the most important problems facing America.

- Minnesota, historically, boasts one of the lowest uninsured rates in the nation (4.4% in 2018).
- However, Minnesota's unemployment rate jumped to 9.9% in May 2020, which likely severed tens of thousands of Minnesotans from their employer-sponsored insurance.
- In March and April 2020, **9,482 Minnesotans enrolled in private health insurance plans**, and more than **13,700** applied for public health insurance programs during <u>MNsure's special enrollment period</u>.
- A disproportionate **number of people infected with Coronavirus (44%** on June 8th) are **black, indigenous, and people of color** while making up <u>20%</u> of the state's population.
- As of June 5, 2020, nearly <u>80%</u> of people who have died from COVID-19 in Minnesota were residents of long-term care facilities.
- In May 2020, Minnesota's current state budget which goes through June 2021 was projected to incur a <u>\$2.42 billion budget deficit</u> due to the pandemic.

The COVID-19 pandemic has illuminated the need for practical solutions that address both the immediate challenges and the long-term gaps in our health care systems to ensure Minnesotans can access quality health care they can afford.

KEY MESSAGES FOR CANDIDATES:

- Acknowledge the moment: "Our country is at a pivotal moment. The pandemic, economic recession, and national discussion on race have created a renewed call for action. They have also magnified the critical problems that exist in our health care system."
- **Take an active stance:** "It is long past time to examine our systems and address gaps that have existed for decades. We must find solutions and common ground to build a health care system that serves everyone."
- **Commit to prioritize people's needs:** "I will put people's health care needs first and I'm already formalizing the ways I gather input and work with community and business leaders to put effective solutions in place."
- **Commit to both addressing disparities and finding common ground:** "The health care system, as it's currently structured, isn't working for far too many. I will work to address the lack of fairness and shared needs to build a health care system that works for all of us."
