

Health Care During the COVID Pandemic

The COVID-19 pandemic has illuminated the need for effective solutions that address both the immediate challenges and the long-term gaps in our health care systems to ensure Coloradans can access quality health care they can afford. Americans are feeling a **mix of emotions** related to the pandemic, and **those emotions are overwhelmingly negative.***

Across the board, when asked to rank different concerns, the public is deeply concerned about their **health and financial wellbeing**, describing an interconnection of these parts of their life and broader society.




In addition, the pandemic has illuminated deficiencies of our health care system.

★ People feel that the U.S. was caught unprepared to handle the pandemic and our losses have been greater than those of other countries.

† People **blame government for the inadequate pandemic response, not health care systems.**

National survey conducted May 1-3, 2020, carries a confidence interval of 90%, with a margin of error between 2-4%. It included a sample size of 2,156 respondents, with oversamples for African American women, Republican-identified men and women, and Republican-identified high school-educated white men. Health status of respondents was not collected or oversampled. These findings have been compared with findings from our ongoing listening effort which began before the pandemic.

Promising State Policies to Respond to People's Health Care Needs

In the wake of COVID, policymakers have a critical opportunity to enact solutions to meet their constituents' short- and long-term health care needs. Shared needs and expectations are emerging in response to the pandemic, including the desire for solutions that:

Ensure individuals are able to provide for themselves and their loved ones, especially those worried about the financial impact of the pandemic.

- Protect against high out-of-pocket costs.
- Expand access to telehealth services for people who prefer it to improve access to care.
- Extend Medicaid coverage for new momsⁱⁱⁱ to remove financial barriers to care to support healthier moms and babies.

> Ensure a reliable health care system that is fully resourced to support essential workers and available when it is needed, both now and after the pandemic.

- Ensure safe workplaces for front-line health care workers and essential workers and increase the capacity to maintain a quality health care workforce.
- Ensure that hospitals and health care providers, particularly in <u>rural</u>^{iv} or distressed areas, can sustainably care for their communities.
- Expand mental health services and community workforce to meet increased need.

> Ensure a health care system that cares for everyone, including people who are vulnerable and those who were already struggling before the pandemic hit.

- Adopt an integrated approach to people's overall health by coordinating people's physical health, behavioral health and social service needs.
- Establish coordinated data collection to quickly address needs and gaps in care, especially in vulnerable communities.

Provide accurate information and clear recommendations on the virus and how to stay healthy and safe.

- Build and maintain capacity for detailed and <u>effective testing and surveillance</u>^v of the virus.
- Resource and implement <u>contact tracing</u>^{vi} by utilizing existing programs in state health departments, pursuing public-private partnerships, or app-based solutions while also ensuring strong privacy protections.

The pandemic is showing different impacts for people across Colorado that point to larger challenges individuals and families are grappling.



In Colorado, a <u>disproportionate number</u> of those infected</u> (48.5% on June 30) by COVID-19 are **Black, Indigenous, and people of color** while making up only 32% of the state's population.^{ix}



Access to health care in rural areas[×] has only become more challenging during the pandemic and will likely have **lasting impacts on rural communities.** As of June 30, 2020 the <u>top five counties</u>^{×i} with the highest cases per 100,000 people (Logan, Morgan, Saguache, Eagle, and Crowley) were <u>rural or</u> <u>frontier</u>^{×ii} counties.



Seniors are at greatest risk. Older adults ages 60+ make up <u>89.5% of COVID deaths</u> in the state as of June 30, 2020 while only attributing to 20% of the state's population.^{xiii}



The economic fallout of the pandemic has caused <u>nearly 27 million Americans to lose</u> <u>their employer-based health insurance.^{xiv}</u> An estimated 12.7 million would be eligible for Medicaid; 8.4 million could qualify for subsidies on exchanges; leaving 5.7 million who would need to cover the cost of health insurance policies (<u>COBRA</u>^{xv} policies averaged \$7,188 for a single person to \$20,576 for a family of four) or remain uninsured.



HEALTH COVERAGE:

- The uninsured rate in Colorado was <u>6.5 percent</u> (361,000 Coloradans) in 2019.^{xvi}
- Colorado's **unemployment rate jumped** from a low of 2.5% in February to <u>11.3% in April</u>^{xvii} and was <u>10.5% in June</u>^{xviii} which likely has **severed hundreds of thousands of Coloradans from their employer sponsored insurance.**
- During the Connect for Health Colorado special enrollment period, <u>14,263 Coloradans</u> enrolled in health insurance from March 20 to April 30, 2020.^{xix}



COVID: Data about the virus changes on a daily basis. This is a collection of resources to inform ongoing responses to COVID-19.

- Colorado's first recorded case of COVID-19 was March 5, 2020.**
- Governor Polis declared a state of emergency on <u>March 10th</u>^{xxi} and <u>enacted many measures</u>^{xxii} to control the spread of the virus and provide support to Coloradans.
- Colorado's COVID-19 Case Database tracks the state's infection, death, and hospitalization rates.**
- Colorado's Safer At Home plan provides information on reopening and the metrics deciding the decisions.xxiv
- The state General Assembly <u>passed</u> several relief packages and policies to address the pandemic, however long-term solutions for the state's recovery are needed.^{xxv}



BUDGET:

- A <u>May budget forecast</u> from legislative economists expects the coronavirus to make a \$6.8 billion dent in state tax revenue over the next three years.^{xxvi}
- The General Assembly has already <u>closed a \$3 billion shortfall</u> to balance the budget this year, however more hard decisions will be needed in the coming sessions.^{xxvii}
